## Life's a walk in the park for rescued poodles

POODLES seized from a Waterford property in January 2008 were finally adopted out last Wednesday after nearly two years of legal proceedings.

The RSPCA seized 104 dogs from breeder Geraldine Robertson after inspectors allegedly found them living in inappropriate conditions. That number increased to 147 poodles after some of the pregnant dogs gave birth.

The RSPCA recently held a morning tea to thank foster carers, groomers, vets, shelter staff and volunteers who looked after the animals.

Chief inspector Michael Pecic said it had been an incredibly long

"Thankfully the dogs were under the care of the people who have gone above and beyond the call of duty," he said.

"This morning tea is really the only way we can effectively say thank you.

"It's a heartfelt gesture but it's really almost impossible to adequately express our sincere gratitude to all concerned."

The poodles have cost the RSPCA more than \$1 million in veterinary treatment, medication, food and lodging.

Ms Robertson is facing 149 charges under the Animal Care and Protection Act (2001) in Beenleigh Magistrates Court after she lost her final appeal on October 30.

## Bahrs Scrub study 'a waste of money'

A NEW group lobbying against a large housing development planned for Bahrs Scrub has likened the Logan City Council proposal to the Traveston Dam debacle.

Save Bahrs Scrub spokeswoman Petrina Maizey said thousands of ratepayer dollars would be wasted on preliminary studies and impact statements needed to assess the 4000-lot development's viability.

She said such studies would prove that the 510ha zone bordered by Wuraga and Sharton roads was environmentally significant and that "exceptional" flora and fauna must be protected.

"Ratepayers' money will have to be used by the council only to find what our preliminary investigations and other studies have already made abundantly clear -

that this development is not viable physically, environmentally or economically on 70 to 80 per cent of the selected site," Ms Maizey

Planning and Development Committee chairwoman Cherie Dalley said the council last week created a special steering committee of councillors and bureaucrats to guide planning.

She said that while no members of the public were invited to join, the views of residents would be canvassed when plans went out for public consultation.

"This is something we've done with every one of our local area plans, it is normal process," she

"Our role is to look at what the planners tell us and make decisions."
